Your Council

Your council is the Hudson Valley Council,. A council is responsible for carrying out four functions: membership, finance, program, and unit service. More than 3,000 adult volunteers, assisted by the council support staff, carry out these important priorities in every corner of the Hudson Valley Council.

The Council Service Center is located in Newburgh, NY and provides volunteers with assistance, information and other support. A National Scout Shop is also located at the Council Service Center in Newburgh. The Scout Shop carries uniforms, materials, craft supplies, camping gear and advancements for Scouts and Leaders.

Your District

A district is a geographic service area within the council. Hudson Valley Council is organized into four geographic districts. Each district is led by a volunteer district chairperson, who manages the operations of the district with the assistance of a District Executive. Many additional volunteers manage the important functions of unit service, program, finance, and membership within the district. Each District holds a monthly roundtable meeting for all adult leaders to share information, provide ongoing training, and offer a support system of knowledgeable adults.

The districts and council also offer periodic adult training on topics such as Youth Protection, Position Specific training, Safe Swim Defense, Safety Afloat, and National Youth Leader Training for youth leaders. Training is a vital component of a successful Scouting experience. Every registered adult should complete training for their position as soon as possible after accepting the position. **Youth Protection Training is required of all adults that register with the Boy Scouts of America**

- Units or groups using special equipment or facilities must follow BSA guidelines and current training or certifications.

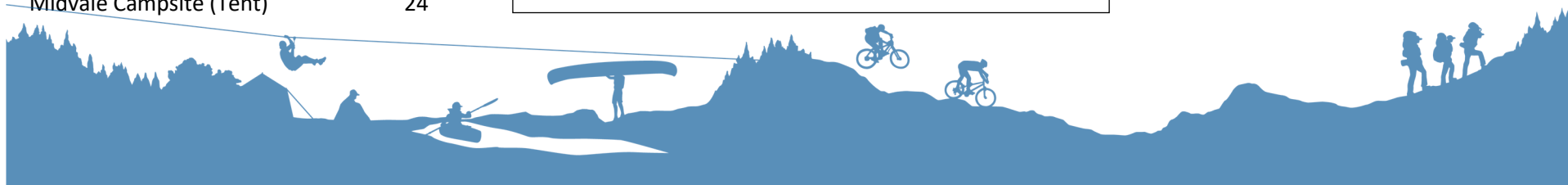

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Council Advancement Committee

The Advancement Committees follow the guidelines established by the BSA. The Council Advancement Committee is comprised of some of the members of each District Advancement Committee, and several “members-at-large”.

The Council Advancement Committee, organizationally, falls under the Council Vice-President for Program. The committee’s members represent a breadth of experience in all Scouting programs. The council professional staff advisor for advancement provides coaching and guidance— especially as it relates to national policies and procedures. The Chairman and the staff advisor work together closely, and in harmony with the other efforts and functions involved in delivering and supporting the Scouting program.

STEM and The Nova Awards

There are four Nova awards for Cub Scouts, Webelos Scouts, Scouts BSA, and Venturers. Each award covers one component of STEM—science, technology, engineering, or mathematics.

Cub Scout Nova Awards: Science Everywhere, Tech Talk, Swing!, and 1-2-3 Go!

Scouts BSA Nova Awards: Shoot!, Start Your Engines, Whoosh!, & Designed to Crunch

Venturer Scout Nova awards: Launch!, Power Up, Hang On!, and Numbers Don't Lie

For their first Nova award, Scouts earn the distinctive Nova award patch. After that, a Scout can earn three more Nova awards, each one recognized with a separate pi (π) pin-on device that attaches to the patch. The patch and the three devices represent each of the four STEM topics—science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

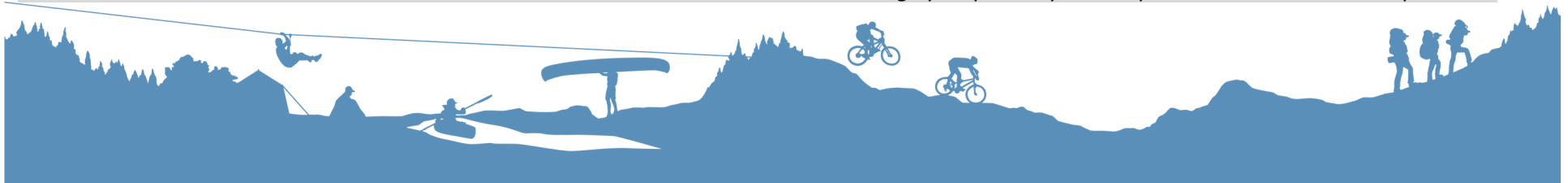
Unit Advancement Chairperson

Each scouting unit should have a Unit Advancement chairperson, which takes on the responsibility of properly tracking and recording the advancement that takes place within the unit. The advancement program is administered by a combination of adult and youth leaders, with young people taking more responsibility as they progress through the program. The role of parents also differs with member age and ability, but parents are encouraged to be engaged at all levels.

All unit leaders should be aware that no one at the unit, district, or council level can alter the rank requirements for youth, even those with disabilities. Please reference the current Guide to Advancement for the proper steps that are necessary to request any special dispensation. The BSA provides opportunities for scouts with permanent disabilities to complete rank advancement. You can also see the Advancement Section of the web site for additional information.

BSA Youth Protection Mission Statement

True youth protection can be achieved only through the focused commitment of everyone in Scouting. It is the mission of Youth Protection volunteers and professionals to work within the Boy Scouts of America to maintain a culture of Youth Protection awareness and safety at the national, regional, area, council, district, and unit levels.

You do not have to be a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America to take Youth Protection training.

To take Youth Protection training go to my.scouting.org and create an account. You'll receive an email notification with your account information, including a member ID/reference number.

From the my.scouting.org portal, click Menu then My Dashboard from the menu list. The My Training page displays to take Youth Protection training. Upon completion, you may print a training certificate to submit with a volunteer application. Your training will automatically be updated in our system and associated with the member ID/reference number issued when you created the account.

When your volunteer application is approved, you will receive a BSA membership card that includes your member ID number.

The Boy Scouts of America places the greatest importance on creating the most secure environment possible for our youth members. To maintain such an environment, the BSA developed numerous procedural and leadership selection policies and provides parents and leaders with resources for the Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, and Venturing programs.

Leadership Selection

The Boy Scouts of America takes great pride in the quality of our adult leadership. Being a leader in the BSA is a privilege, not a right. The quality of the program and the safety of our youth members call for high-quality adult leaders. We work closely with our chartered organizations to help recruit the best possible leaders for their units.

The adult application requests background information that should be checked by the unit committee or the chartered organization before accepting an applicant for unit leadership. While no current screening techniques exist that can identify every potential child abuser, we can reduce the risk of accepting a child abuser by learning all we can about an applicant for a leadership position—his or her experience with children, why he or she wants to be a Scout leader, and what discipline techniques he or she would use.

Required Training

- Youth Protection training is required for all BSA registered volunteers.
- Youth Protection training must be taken every year. If a volunteer's Youth Protection training record is not current at the time of re-charter, the volunteer will not be reregistered.

The “three R’s” of Youth Protection convey a simple message for the personal awareness of our youth members:

- **Recognize** that anyone could be an abuser.
- **Respond** when someone is doing something that goes against your gut or against the safety guidelines.
- **Report** attempted or actual abuse or any activity that you think is wrong to a parent or other trusted adult.



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Youth Protection Reporting Procedures for Volunteers

There are two types of Youth Protection–related reporting procedures all volunteers must follow:

1. When you witness or suspect any child has been abused or neglected—See “Mandatory Report of Child Abuse” below.
2. When you witness a violation of the BSA’s Youth Protection policies—See “Reporting Violations of BSA Youth Protection Policies” below.

Mandatory Report of Child Abuse

All persons involved in Scouting shall report to local authorities any good-faith suspicion or belief that any child is or has been physically or sexually abused, physically or emotionally neglected, exposed to any form of violence or threat, exposed to any form of sexual exploitation, including the possession, manufacture, or distribution of child pornography, online solicitation, enticement, or showing of obscene material. You may not abdicate this reporting responsibility to any other person.

Steps to Reporting Child Abuse

1. Ensure the child is in a safe environment.
2. In cases of child abuse or medical emergencies, call 911 immediately. In addition, if the suspected abuse is in the Scout’s home or family, you are required to contact the local child abuse hotline.
3. Notify the Scout Executive or his/her designee.

Reporting Violations of BSA Youth Protection Policies

If you think any of the BSA’s Youth Protection policies have been violated, including those described within Scouting’s Barriers to Abuse, you must notify your local council Scout Executive or his/her designee so appropriate action can be taken for the safety of our Scouts.

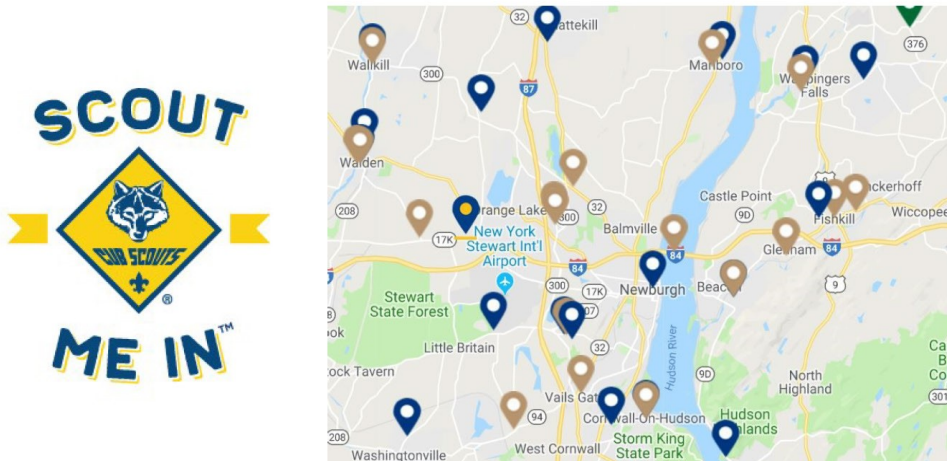


Updating your BeAScout pin is essential for recruiting.

Updating your BeAScout.org pin is simple, and it's a good way to make sure your information is current — that it doesn't list last year's Cubmaster or meeting time, for example. Access to update your pin is available to all unit leaders, including committee members in a unit.

To update your pin:

1. Go to [My.Scouting.org](https://my.scouting.org)
2. In the drop-down menu, go to Legacy Web Tools and select BeAScout.
3. Choose "unit" (rather than council) under "Unit Pin Mode" to update the pin with your contact info.
4. Be sure to set pin status to "active." If they want the "Apply Now" button on the pin, set "Apply Status" to "active."
5. Note that it may take a few hours, or up to overnight, for the updated information to show up.
6. **For Cub Scout packs:** You'll also want to go to Organization Manager and identify your pack's gender: all-boy, all-girl or a mix of all-boy dens and all-girl dens. Under Organization Manager, find the settings tab and scroll to the bottom of the page. The default is Boys Dens, but you can change that. Be sure to enter an effective date or it will not update the pin.

General Considerations for Social Media Use



Social media must be monitored. A qualified staff member or volunteer should have the responsibility of monitoring social media channels daily, and backup administrators/monitors should be designated so there is no gap in the monitoring.

Integrate your communications. Create a strategy to surround your intended audience with your key message(s) through print, the Web, email, radio, TV, word of mouth, and social media.

Talk to your audiences and let them talk to and about you. By posting content on a consistent schedule, you can tell your story and encourage conversations in the community.

Social media takes a thick skin. Negative conversations are happening already, but now you have a voice in the conversation. Don't delete negative comments unless they violate the terms laid out in the BSA Social Media Digital Contract.

Be prepared to respond to negative or inaccurate posts if response is warranted. Some negative comments do not require a response, while others should be taken seriously and addressed. Factors such as the number of followers and the severity of the conversations should temper if and how you respond.

Direct media inquiries to the appropriate person. Media inquiries coming through social media should be referred to the Scout Executive or a designee for an official response.

Be Scout-like. When disagreeing with others' opinions, remain appropriate and polite. If you find yourself in a situation online that looks as if it's becoming antagonistic, do not get overly defensive and do not disengage from the conversation abruptly. Ask your Scout Executive or the designee for advice on how to disengage from the dialogue in a polite manner that reflects well.

Basic Information

PURPOSE OF THE BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA *incorporated on February 8, 1910 and chartered by Congress in 1916, is to provide an educational program for boys, girls, and young adults to build character, to train in the responsibilities of participating citizenship, and to develop personal fitness and leadership skills. Community groups receive national charters to use the scouting program as a part of their own youth work. These groups which have goals compatible with those of the BSA include: religious, educational, civic, fraternal, business, labor, governmental bodies, corporations, professional associations, and groups of citizens. To achieve the stated aims of character building, citizenship training, and personal fitness, the B.S.A. offers these program phases.*

SCOUTS BSA: For boys and girls grades 6-12, is designed to achieve Scouting's objectives through a vigorous outdoor program and peer group leadership with the counsel, of an adult Scoutmaster. (*Youth may become a Scout if they have completed the fifth grade, or are 11 years old, or have earned the Arrow of Light Award, but are older than 10 years of age*)

CHARTERED ORGANIZATION REPRESENTATIVE: Your COR is a very important part of you unit's and chartered organization's leadership. In addition to overseeing the program and selecting and approving unit leadership, they are also a voting member of the council and a member of the district committee. Each COR should make a concerted effort to attend the monthly District Committee meetings and the Council Annual Meeting.

COMMISSIONERS: A Unit Commissioner works with the adult leaders of a unit to help them operate at maximum efficiency. A Commissioner is concerned with the unit's ability to deliver the ideals and purposes of Scouting to youth. You will find your unit's Commissioner to be extremely helpful. If you do not know the Commissioner who is assigned to your unit, please contact your District Commissioner.

COUNCIL OPERATIONS: The Hudson Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America, operates Scouting in this area. Many volunteers staff the administrative body called the Executive Board. They oversee all Scouting within Dutchess, Orange, Rockland and Sullivan Counties in New York and Pike County in Pennsylvania. Working with these volunteers is a small group of professional Scouters. For administrative purposes, the Council is divided into Four Districts –Delaware River, Dutchess, Heritage, and Rockland. The Council and its Districts have operating committees made up of volunteers to deal with parts of the entire program such as training, camping, activities, finance, etc. Both the Council and District operating committees meet on a regular basis.

CUB SCOUTING: Cub Scouting is a family and home centered program for boys and girls who are in kindergarten through fifth grades (or ages 6 to 10). Kindergarteners are called Lions, First Graders are called Tigers, Second Grade – Wolves, Third Grade – Bears. The second half of this program for fourth and fifth graders is called Webelos and prepares them to become Scouts. Boys and girls may become Webelos Scouts if they are 10 years of age or have completed the third grade. The Cub Scout meets weekly in his or her den and the Cub family meets monthly at the Pack meeting.

EXPLORING: Exploring is a career education program for young men and women who are 14 (and have completed the eighth grade) through 20 years old. Exploring clubs are for youth in grades 6th - 8th. It's purpose is to provide experiences to help young people mature and to prepare them to become responsible and caring adults.

Haunted Harvest- Fall One Day Family Event open to the public that includes haunted houses, Archery, BB Guns, Hay Rides, Midway Games, Pumpkin Patch, and other fun activities.

INSURANCE: As part of the council budget and your unit's \$40 Liability fee, the council maintains a general liability insurance policy for you and your chartered organization's protection to cover damages caused by an occurrence arising out of or during official Scouting functions and activities. When necessary, Certificates of Insurance' can be issued in favor of owners of premises and other facilities used by your unit for Scouting. Although medical insurance is primarily a family's responsibility, the Council has a Council Wide Scout Accident Insurance Plan. The amount insurance policies cost your unit is \$12 per participant yearly premium.

Merit Badge College (MBC) Offers Scouts an opportunity to meet with highly qualified professionals to learn and foster the development of lifelong interests. Emphasis is given to career and hobby oriented Merit Badges' (MB) especially those MB's with a limited availability of counselors, or requiring specialized equipment (such as Welding). Held annually in March

POPCORN SALE: This council run product sale is a cooperative, mutually beneficial, fundraiser helping the Scouting Units as well as your Council. The funds generated support scouting at all levels, allowing scouting to really deliver the program it promises to our youth. Every unit in the Hudson Valley Council should sell popcorn!

Program Launch This is where you need to have good unit representation to gather all the needed information to plan the great program your youth deserve. Each of the District Committees will be represented and have planning and support information to help support your planning for the upcoming scouting year. Get Ideas and resources to make it happen.

REGISTRATION: A person is not a member of the BSA until he or she is properly registered. This is accomplished by submitting a new member application or re-chartering with the unit, district, or council. Applications must be sent to the Council Service Center as soon as the new member joins. By doing this, paperwork doesn't become misplaced, mailing lists are accurate and the new member will receive his or her membership card promptly through the unit leader of record.

REGISTRATION FEES: are pro-rated based on your unit charter expiration date and support the unit budget plan concept. Please ensure that all addresses are the mailing addresses of the youth member or adult leader registering. All adult leaders and Merit Badge Counselors must be registered.

REPORTING SERIOUS ACCIDENTS: If a serious accident or property damage occurs, you should notify the Council Service Center immediately if during normal office hours. If a serious accident, major property damage, lost child, child abuse, or death occurs after office hours or during the weekend, the Council Executive or your District Executive must be called immediately. They have

responsibilities which necessitate knowing immediately what has happened and advising on proper procedures to follow. In these instances, do not hesitate to call, no matter the time of day.

ROUNDTABLES FOR SCOUTS BSA LEADERS: A monthly gathering of Scoutmasters, Assistants, and Committee Chairmen of the district to receive program ideas for the coming month. It gives a chance to share ideas with others. New ideas for games, ceremonies, song, stunts, etc., are offered. Council and District Activities for Scout Troops are outlined at the Roundtable. Under the leadership of an experienced staff, all interested Scout Leaders are invited to attend.

ROUNDTABLES FOR CUB SCOUT LEADERS: These monthly meetings, for adult Cub Scout leaders are held on a district basis. Den and Pack leaders join for fun and Fellowship while learning tricks, stunts, games, crafts, ceremonies, songs, skits and other ideas that will help them with their packs and dens. These Roundtables are under the guidance of a highly competent and experienced Roundtable Commissioner Staff. Upcoming details on district and council activities for Cub Scouts and their leaders are also shared. Roundtable attendance is a must for Cubmasters, Den Leaders and Coaches, and Webelos Leaders.

UNIFORMING: One of the important methods used in achieving the aims of Scouting is the uniform. It builds a sense of identity and pride, provides a place of rank and leadership insignia, and influences the member's behavior and expectations. Each youth member should be encouraged to secure and wear his uniform at all Scouting functions. Of course, as leaders you will want to create a positive environment for uniform wearing by setting the right example. The uniform does cost money and young people grow fast. Many units maintain a uniform exchange for youth members, no matter their socioeconomic background.

University of Scouting UOS: Is a one-day council wide educational opportunity to expand leader's knowledge and ability to deliver the program of Scouting. It is run in a class room setting where you can sign up and attend informational and interactive classes of your choice. Held annually in November.

VENTURING: Venturing is a youth development program for young men and women who are 14 through 20 years of age. It provides options for young men and woman who are looking for rugged high adventure activities while providing positive experiences to help prepare them to become mature, responsible, and caring adults.

Glossary of Terms.

The Following list defines meetings, functions, programs, and organizations commonly found in the National Boy Scout Program. You will find them throughout your calendar. The Abbreviation is in case we use it.

BALOO: Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation is the introductory training Cub Scout leaders. Leaders should complete this training before taking Cub Scouts on an overnight camping trip. BSA's Cub Scout level camping policies will be taught along with the necessary tools to help units carry out a successful camping experience. Completion of this course is mandatory for at least one adult on a Pack overnighter.

Camp Bullowa, owned by the Hudson Valley Council is available during "off-season" for unit and district outings, when arrangements are made through the council office. Site of Cub Scout Day Camp and Scouts BSA Adventure Camp.

Camp Nooteeming, owned by the Hudson Valley Council is available during "off-season" for unit and district outings, when arrangements are made through the council office. Site of Cub Scout Day Camp and Scouts BSA Adventure Camp. Also, the site of National Youth Leader Training (NYLT).

Chartered Organization Representative: A representative from the unit chartered organization. Responsible for unit leadership selection and approvals, overseeing program, a voting member of the district and council and a member of the District Committee.

Charter Turn in Each Units' Charter is renewed annually. Properly signed paperwork must be submitted in each district after the on-line re-chartering is complete.

Cub Scout Fast Start: Initial online Cub Scout Leader training/orientation.

Distinguished Citizen Award Dinner (DCAD) / Good Scout Award: A Council fund-raising dinner honoring a distinguished citizen or organization in the community who has helped both Scouting and the community using the principal of the Scout Oath and Law.

District Camporee: Overnight/weekend District level outdoor experience, typically theme related. Provides troops an opportunity to develop outdoor skills and interact with other units within the District.

District Committee Group of elected Scouters and Chartered Organization Representatives responsible for administration of the Scouting program within a given geographical boundary. All districts within a council are responsible for carrying out four standard functions: (1) Membership, (2) Finance, (3) Program, which includes Camp Promotion, Activities and Civic Service, Training, Advancement and Recognition, (4) Unit Service (Commissioner Service).

District Nominating Committee: Appointed by the District Chair to identify, recruit and nominate district officers and district Members-at-Large on an annual basis.

Friends of Scouting (FOS): A council-wide annual fund-raising campaign providing Scout parents, Cub parents, volunteers, local community members and business leaders the opportunity to make a difference in the life of a youth.

High Adventure: The BSA does provide for a top-quality wilderness experience through a variety of High Adventure programs. The Council office has information on many different High Adventure programs including: Philmont Scout Ranch, Summit Bechtel Reserve.

Northern Tier High Adventure Area, and Florida Sea Base.

IOLS: Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills is an outdoor skills and leadership course for Scoutmasters. Working as a patrol, this hands-on course provides adult leaders the practical outdoor skills they need to lead Scouts in a safe and appropriate out-of-doors program. Upon completion, leaders should feel comfortable teaching **Scouts** the basic outdoor skills needed for the Tenderfoot through First Class ranks. **IOLS** is one of two training courses needed for Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters to qualify as trained leaders. The other required course is Boy Scout Leader Specific Training (BSLST).

Klondike/ Freez-o-Ree: A one-day event for Boy Scouts to exhibit their skills and knowledge in a competitive environment. Freez-o-Rees are Klondike's with overnight camping. These activities are, typically, district or combined district events.

NYLT: National Youth Leadership Training is an exciting, action-packed program designed for youth members of the Boy Scouts of America to learn and practice the leadership skills and experience they can use in their home units and in other situations demanding leadership of self and others.

Order of the Arrow (OA): The Order of the Arrow is a national brotherhood of Scout Honor Campers. Membership is through election by youth members within the Troop. The OA lodge performs valuable service projects throughout the year at both of our council camps.

Parent/Scout Overnight: A shared "fun" weekend for all Cubs and their parents. Program provides opportunity for parents and Scouts to work together on projects and advancements. Scouts and parents also share in cooking out and camping on this overnight outing. Great opportunity for parents to "get to know" their kids.

Program Themes: A series of monthly ideas and activities promoted each year through the National Council of the BSA. Monthly themes are supported through the annual "program helps" and articles in Boys' Life and Scouting magazines.

Re-chartering: The unit "charter" must be renewed each year and reviewed by the Chartered Organization and the local council.

Registration: A person becomes a member of the BSA by submitting a new member application or rechartering with a unit, district or council. All applications are sent to the Council Service Center for processing. *

Roundtable: A monthly gathering providing the opportunity for leaders to receive and share information. Conducted by Roundtable Commissioner Staff with details of upcoming district and council activities and events. A "must attend" for all Cub and Scout leaders.

School Night for Scouting: Each year, a "Scout Night" to recruit new youth and parents is held in September. This is the time for your unit to promote and explain Scouting and your program to the youth and parents/guardians in your neighborhood and recruit youth and leaders into Scouting.

* Completion of Youth Protection Training is a pre-requisite to adult registration.

SPST: Scoutmaster Position Specific Training is a course to provide Scoutmasters with the basic information and tools they need to lead successful Boy Scout troops. Scoutmasters and assistant Scoutmasters who complete SPST, IOLS, & YPT are considered "trained" for those positions.

STEM: science, technology, engineering and mathematics is a curriculum based on the idea of educating students in these four specific disciplines in an interdisciplinary and applied approach.

STEAM: Adds Arts to the STEM Program

Summer Camp: Summer camp is often the highlight of a Cub Scout and Boy Scout's yearly program. It provides each Scout an opportunity to learn, have fun, interact with other Scouts, and to put into practice skills they have learned in their Scouting career. Cub Scout Day Camp at Camp Bullowa or Nooteeming offers the opportunity to participate in fire building, knots and lashing, compass and map work, crafts, swimming, boating and many more fun things. Scouts BSA Summer Camp provides the same opportunities but at a higher level, a wider experience in the outdoors, and a much more challenging and fulfilling experience. Each troop should encourage their Scouts to attend summer camp. Registration, should occur early in the year (Jan., Feb.) to ensure availability at convenient times. Units should be preparing for Summer Camp throughout the year. Summer camp should be a Scout's annual highlight.

Summertime Pack Award: Scouting is a year-round program, but often the summer is a time for a break in the normal routine. This award recognizes those packs and individuals who continue the pack program through the months of June, July and August. Applications and information are available from the Council Service Center.

VAPST: Venture Advisor Position-Specific Training is designed to introduce adult Venturing Crew Advisors and Associate Advisors to the basic information needed to operate a Crew.

VOA: Venturing Officers' Association is a group of Youth and their Adult Advisors who work to provide support and guidance to maintain and grow the Venturing program throughout our council. The VOA collaborates with other committees in providing training for Venturers and Advisors, programming for crews, and a monthly forum to bring together youth and Advisors.

Webelos to Scout Transition: One of the purposes of the Webelos program is to prepare them to become Boy Scouts. The Webelos Leaders, Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, and Unit Commissioner should ensure each Webelos graduates into a Boy Scout Troop.

Wood Badge Advance leader training offered to Cub leaders and Boy Scout leaders. When completed, the participant is presented his or her Wood Badge beads, signifying successful completion of the training.

YPT Youth Protection Training: Every adult leader must be properly educated in YPT, encourage each family to use the "*How to Protect Your Children from Child Abuse & Drug Abuse*" booklet included in each Scout handbook. All adult Scouters must have Youth Protection training prior to registration.

Who Should Attend Training?

- If you have completed an Adult Scout Leader application, you should attend training
- Every adult Scout leader position has important tasks to bring to the program in your pack, troop, team, crew or post.

What Makes a Trained Leader?

Adult leaders in units are considered trained, and eligible to wear the official “Trained” emblem, once they have completed Youth Protection Training and the training courses outlined below, or have completed Youth Protection Training and a previous basic training course when it was current.

Training Requirements

- Youth Protection required for all adults. **Must be renewed every Year**
- All “direct contact” leaders, i.e., Cubmasters, Scoutmasters, Crew Advisors, Den Leaders and Assistant Scoutmasters, etc., will also have to earn the Trained® patch for their position

NOTE:

You do not have to be a registered member or have a member ID to take Youth Protection Training.

- If you're not registered yet or can't find your Member ID, you can skip this step and still set up an account.



How do I add my Member ID number to my account?

- If you originally set up an account without your Member ID number, you can go back and add it later.
- Log in, click "Update My Profile," choose Hudson Valley Council from the list and enter your Member ID number.

Now You're Ready to Train Online!

- Once you create your account, you will pick a user name and password.
 - You'll need this user name and password every time you log in.
 - When you log in, you'll see a link to E-Learning on the left.
 - Click there to see the courses you've taken and other available courses.
 - When you complete an online course, be sure to print a copy of the certificate for your files.
 - You can also re-print the certificate at a later date.
1. Once you complete a training course, return to the course selection page, and click E-Learning on the left side of the page to refresh the browser.
 2. The course status is now completed.
 3. Click "View Certificate" to view and print your training certificate.

Training Validation

It's easy to check training records to see that your ScoutNet records match the training you or your unit members have completed. Just log into www.myscouting.org, click on "Training Validation," then check to see if your trainings have been recorded in the Council's computer system. We are encouraging all units to use this system to check the training status of all registered leaders. All you need is a list of everyone's membership ID Numbers and you can review the training status of the registered adult leaders. A list of these numbers can be found on your charter paper-work or you can obtain a list from your District Professional.
